






ADMINISTRATION - DEC (Pronounced "deck") District Executive Committee [DEC] - 2017-2018 TERM

Some 3 years ago at its February meeting, the Board of Directors decided on the new district leader titles, which took effect July 1, 2015. Below is the 3rd generation of District 18 leaders.

"Vince", the semifinalist proceeding to Vancouver in August interview by PEARL MATIBE

It is a hot Thursday in June. At 7:30pm, the temperature is 80°outside, yet Vince has a calm demeanor.

It's been over 4 weeks since your Spring Conference win in the International Speech Contest - how does it feel?

Still overwhelmed. You'd think that I'd be back on the ground.

What's the agenda on the day of your semifinals?

Thursday, August 24 is the semifinals, 10 semifinals. 3 concurrently, all on the one day. The winner of each semifinal round proceeds to the next round 24-hours later on that Friday.

Born Biago Vincent Schettini in Brooklyn, everyone calls him Vince. Named after his paternal grandfather, Vince's family is from Florence, southern Italy. One day after shopping around for a house, he found a suitable one for himself. In a small town called Viola, just outside Dover, Delaware. Population at last count: 157! It's been 10 years and he loves it there. Of course he does. He'd moved around a lot working in federal government including Chicago.

Why Toastmasters?

I was introduced while working in Chicago. There was a club meeting once a week across from where I worked. Then I moved to other states including Washington. I joined to learn how to better communicate. I'm a man of few words. It's wasn't easy to express myself in front of people and I get nervous.

Vince, you didn't look nervous on stage, the audience loved your winning speech "The Reunion".

There was a lot of laughter so I think it was effective.

Why did you choose this title?

It's a true story. Here's how the speech idea came about. I was disengaged while doing yard work, and the speech came together. Then I gave it at my club, then at Polished Professionals Advanced Toastmasters and so on, and received good feedback that I should do it at a contest. Then I added more stories.

As I continue to talk to Vince, I realize: for someone who grew up watching his father sketching the solar system, an engineer, a 4-time Area Governor that has had every club officer role, he's fascinating to listen to.

What is your leadership style?

I have an attitude of service. I'm available whenever people need me. I belong to the Knights of Columbus. A leader is a servant. I know that goes against the grain of the world, but, an effective leader serves.









What was the best decision you have ever made?

Toastmasters certainly ranks as one of the best decisions I have ever made. Before joining Toastmasters, just the thought of having to speak in front of an audience, whether it numbered four or four hundred, was terrifying; I would be shaking with fear. Over time, going through the Toastmasters program, learning new skills, becoming comfortable speaking in front of an audience, and being able to prepare and deliver effective presentations, has made my Toastmasters experience very rewarding. I am still not comfortable with Table Topics, but I am a work-in-progress. The fact that I, a quiet, shy, retiring stutterer, is able to stand in the company of some of the best speakers in District 18, is a testimony that the Toastmasters program does work.

What legacy do you want to leave, and be remembered for?

The legacy that I would like to leave, and be remembered for, would be as an Encourager. If I know of someone who is going through some trying time, I do what I can to help; if I cannot change the circumstance, I can always give a word of encouragement. One reason I like to enter speech contests is to be able to share a message of encouragement with a varied audience. Also, mentoring people, encouraging them, whether it is in Toastmasters, music, or any other area, is something that I thoroughly enjoy. Watching a protégé grow and excel is exciting and rewarding.

The Free Speakers Toastmasters Club chartered on July 1, 1995. It began meeting on Dover Air Force Base, in one of the Command Squadron conference rooms. It was initially started as a closed Club, opened only to the military and civilian personnel affiliated with the Air Base. In the year 2000, as a result of the Club struggling with membership, the Club was opened to the community.

Then the events of 9-11 occurred.

Access to the Air Base became very restrictive. It became very difficult

for the members not affiliated with the Air Base to gain access thereto.

meeting location outside the Air Base. The Club began meeting at the American Legion Hall, on Bay Road, in Dover, just outside of the Air Base. They met there for a few months. Then they moved the meeting location to Calvary Assembly of God Church, on Route 10, in Dover. They met there for some two years. Then the church policies changed, restricting outside organizations from meeting on the church premises. At that time, one of the members was working at TGI Fridays, on Route 13, in Dover. He was able to arrange for the Club to meet in one of the private rooms there. The Club met there for about one year. The location was very noisy, and not very conducive to effective Club meetings. The Club decided to look for another meeting location. One of the members, who joined, while the Club was meeting at TGI Fridays, was a resident of Westminster Village, an assisted living community, located on the corner of College and McKee Roads, in Dover. In 2005, she was able to arrange for the Club to meet at the Westminster Village Community Center. The Club began to meet in one of the classrooms. Eventually, the Club moved into the main conference room. The Club has been meeting there ever since. END

WHY YOU SHOULD GO TO CLUB OFFICER TRAINING



In the July/August timeframe, the District hosts club officer training. Whether you are a brand new Club Officer, a tenured Club Officer, or not a Club Officer, there are several reasons for you to attend a Club Officer Training session.

- It is a great way to meet and network with other Toastmasters.
- You gain confidence in your role and being part of a leadership team.
- You gain new ideas, and offer your ideas to others.

If you are a brand new officer/ new Toastmaster...

- You become part of group of peers, which is now your support group.
- Just like starting a new job where you are trained, we similarly provide you the tools and resources to be successful.

If you are a prior officer and holding the same or a different position...

- If you are repeating a Club Officer role, volunteer to lead a general session or a breakout session. You would be sharing your expertise with others.
- Go and support a newer officer. Introduce them to people you know, and help them expand their network. In addition, after the training, if the new officer has other questions, you can answer them.
- You meet more people who can be future resources for questions, joint club meetings, or future leaders
- If you are not a Club Officer, you can attend the training for these reasons...
- If you considering a Club Officer role in the future, you can understand the responsibilities in advance. You can even volunteer to be the Assistant to the role.
- Are you a leader in another organization? Take the information from the Toastmasters roles and incorporate the responsibilities into your role. There may be best practices that could benefit your other organization.

The added benefit to what is described above is that if 4 officers attend the training that completes half of the requirement for goal #9 in the Distinguished Club Program (DCP). The DCP is the measurement that recognizes that clubs are providing a positive and supportive environment that leads to member success.
